Catherine Lambermont's practice and research move seamlessly between photography, painting, sculpture and installation in an experimentation using an extensive repertoire of techniques and materials to address the self, spatial, and time.

She draws her inspiration from the nature and the mundeane but also from beliefs, memories and personal experience to explore different layers of landscape, real, inner, unseen, which intertwine with each other. In the process and as a result, the in-between plays a key role.

The body of work is diverse and yet minimalist. It questions the unfamiliar through the familiar using an abstract or reduced vocabulary that combines a geometry of shapes, lines, curves and sometimes organic matter.

Errances

A latent image, a collection of memories.

I walk through the natural landscape, getting drown in my thoughts, letting my steps guiding me, memories blooming onto the surface of my consciousness.

Walking alone allows unexpected encounters to emerge on the changing horizon.

I feel the rhythm of the colors, smell the perfume of nature, sometimes listen to the silence, hear a strange rustle and without any advance notice, an imaginary scenery pops up.

Wandering, is to go extremely close and incredibly far, in a pendular movement of the body and the mind, in a physical and emotional journey.

As much as the clock of time is ticking, the strata of my landscaping experience constantly intertwin, bridging reality and fiction, taming each other, and vice versa, in an ultimate attempt to draw a picture.

































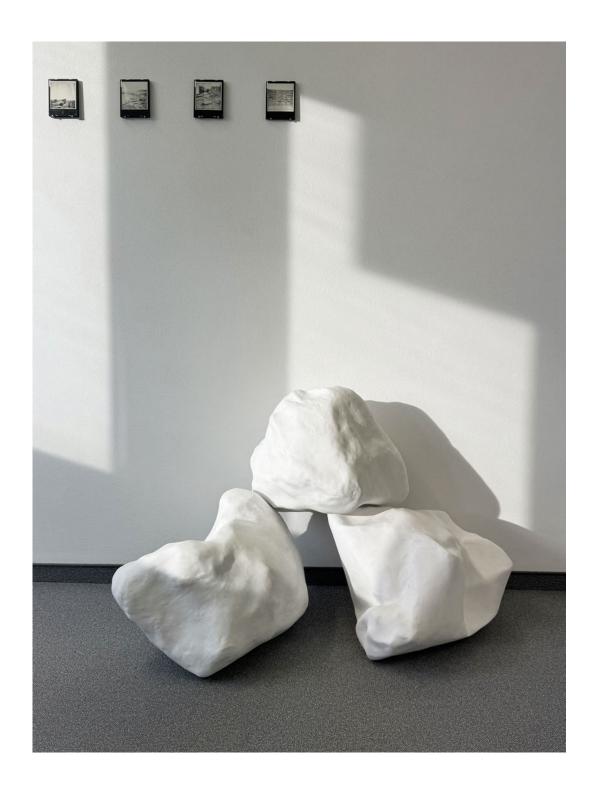

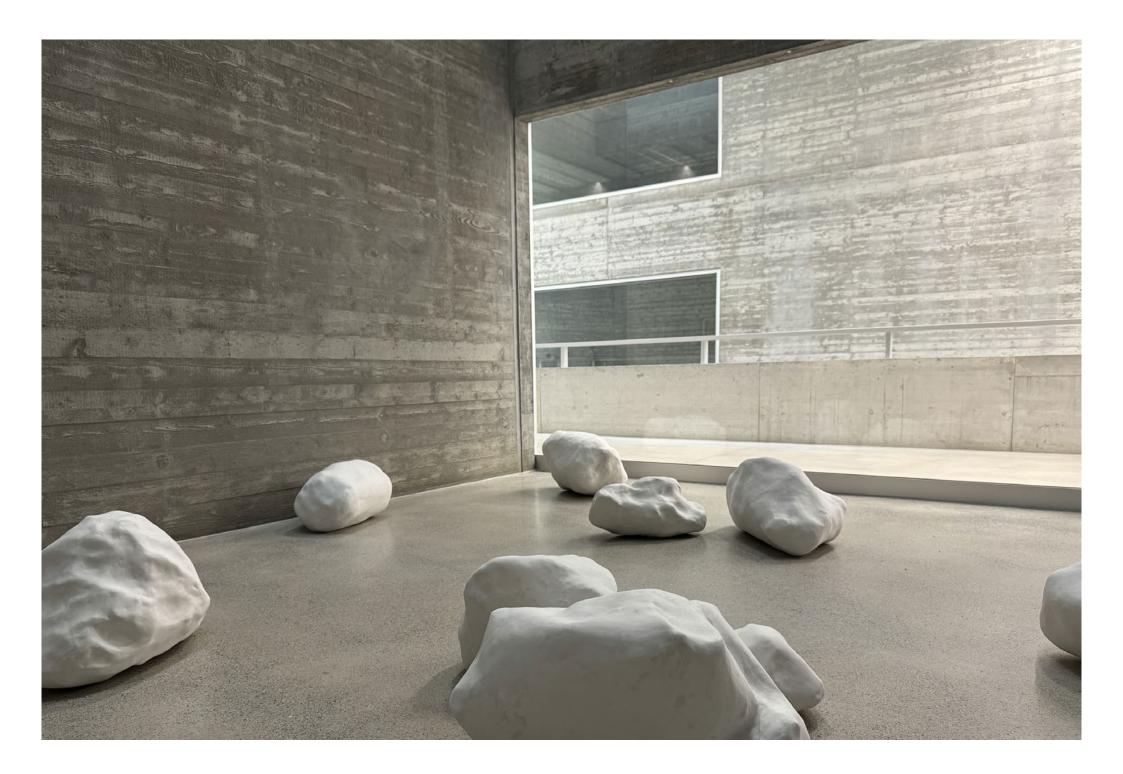

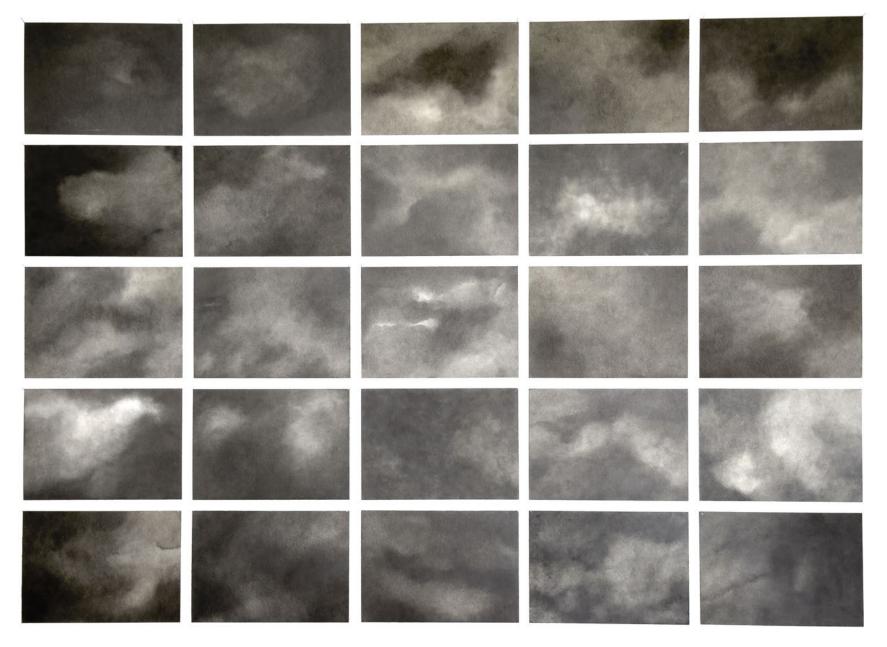


The series of drawings titled **Sky** took its source in a deep valley of the Engadin mountains where Catherine Lambermont spent a couple of months.

An universal map of the sky from various parts of the world.

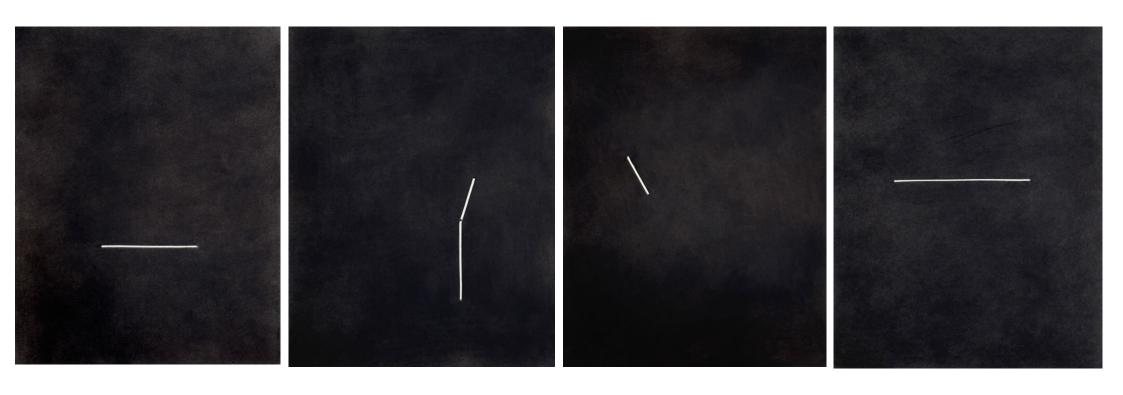






Engadin Sky. Graphite on paper, 100×70 cm, 2024

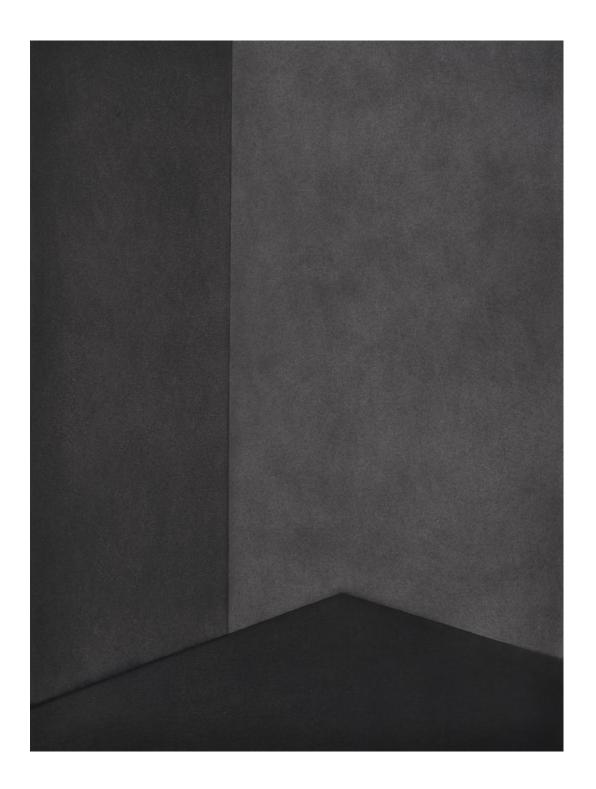


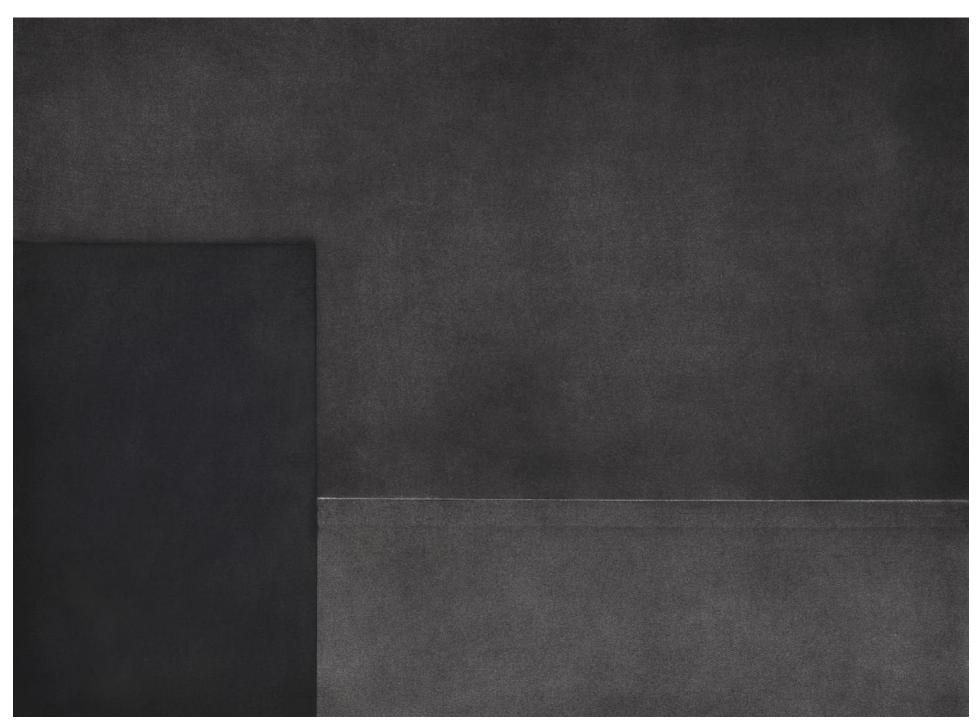


Suite

Untitled. Charcoal on paper, 55×73 cm, 2023

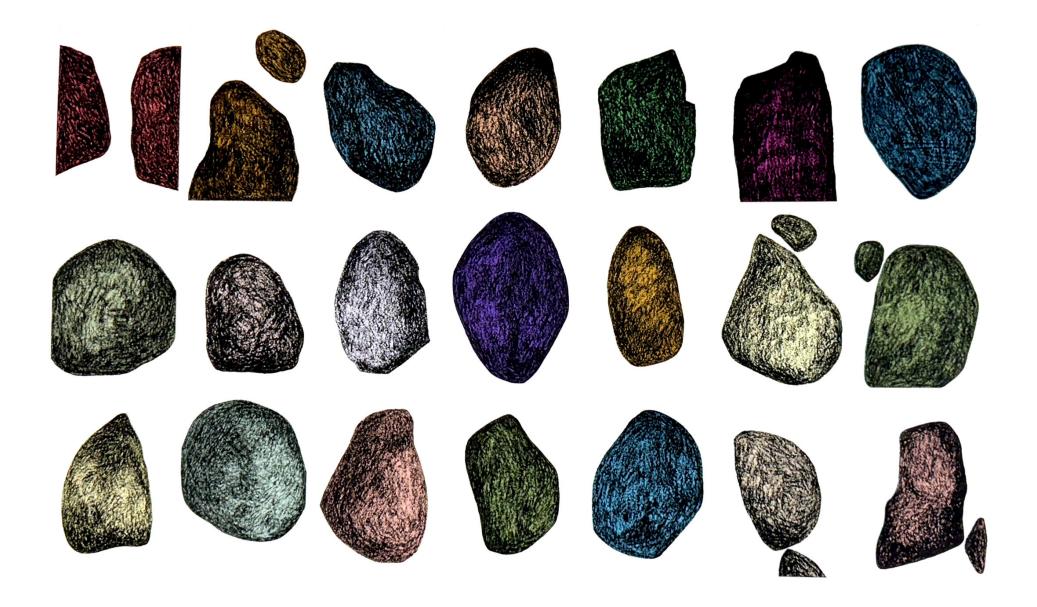


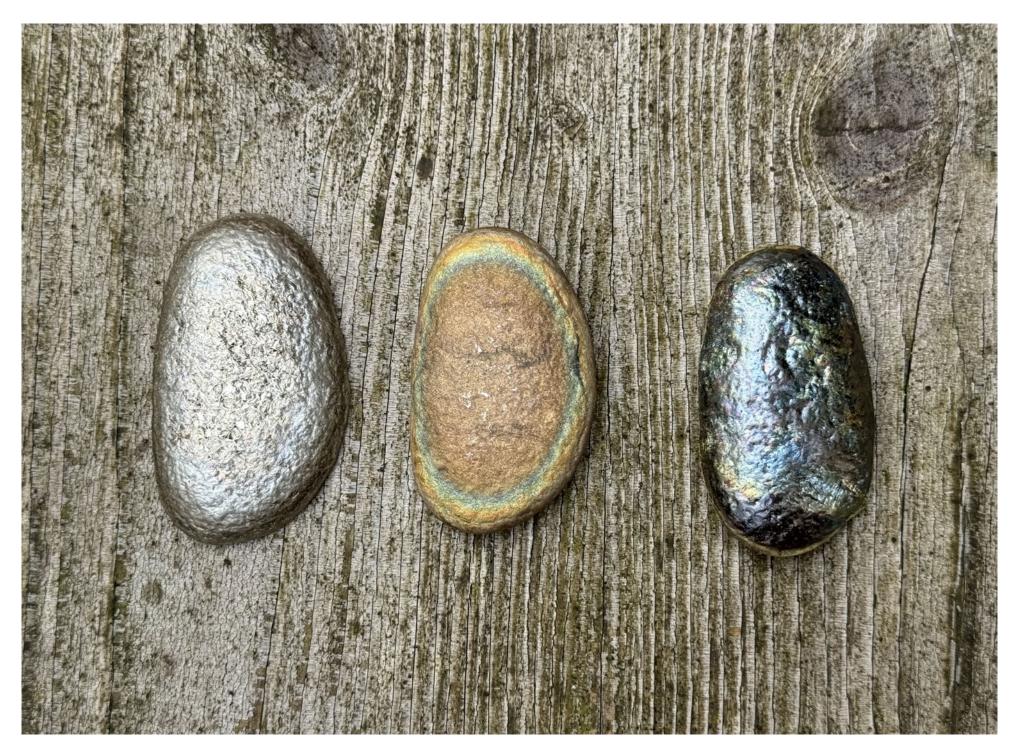

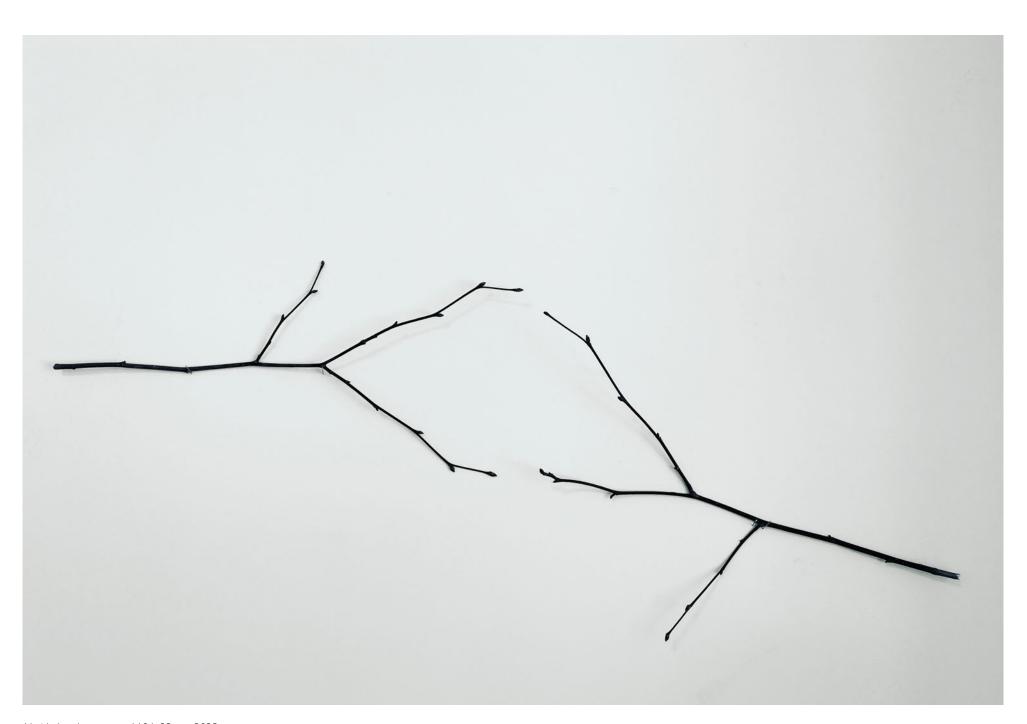






Variations for a pebble. Tin, silver, brass, sand-casting, 2024

















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
